



Race Equality Network Announces New Co-chairs

The University of Cambridge Race Equality Network is delighted to announce that Professor Franklin Aigbirhio and Dr Rabia Dada-Oughton are the new network Chairs.



Prof. Franklin Aigbirhio is based at the Wolfson Brain Imaging Centre at the Cambridge Biomedical Campus. He is the Professor of Molecular Imaging Chemistry at the Department of Clinical Neurosciences in the University's Clinical School and Senior Research Fellow at Magdalene College. Franklin research focuses on developing novel imaging technologies and methods and their application to biomedical research.

Dr Rabia Dada-Oughton works in the Cambridge Endowment for Research in Finance, at the University of Cambridge. She has lived and worked in Cambridge since 2011. Rabia holds a MA in Race and Resistance and a PhD in Postcolonial History. She was educated in Pakistan, the US, Canada and the UK, and is an alumna of Darwin College.



The chairs of the Race Equality Network intend to embed ownership of the network within the membership and take a lead on the development of the network. Their goal is to translate discussions into tangible actions to improve the experience of racially-minoritised staff at the University.

As chairs of the network Professor Aigbirhio and Dr Dada-Oughton state: "It's a pleasure and honour to be Co-Chairs for Race Equality Network.

These are turbulent times. The COVID-19 pandemic, with its disproportionately impact on the BAME community and the George Floyd incident crystallising many evident issues. We now have the University entering a phase of significant financial reductions, which could result in major impact on network members.
